"Recommendation" Statement

In this book, Nabeel Qureshi examines Islamic traditions and scripture to shed light on 18 questions regarding Islam and *jihad*, and their role in terrorism. In doing this, he examines their history and various scholarly perspectives to avoid simplistic extremes while dealing with complex topics. Yet, the book is designed to be read by average readers and contains helpful appendices.

The goal of this short book is to raise public awareness of issues and concerns that must be addressed in answering *jihad*, rather than to offer a definitive answer to this vexing aspect of Islam. Nabeel openly wrestles with his own faith on issues such as self-defense versus retaliation and individual motives versus societal preservation. Some of his conclusions have been criticized but have helped to open up conversation nonetheless. In any case, Nabeel comes across as refreshingly authentic and open to other suggestions while admitting his own biases on the subject.

This work gives a concise history of Islam that helps readers to make sense of *jihad* and its various interpretations. It also explains who some of the leading voices are behind the current wave of terrorism and their motivations, and gives some insight into leading terrorist organizations such as Al-Qaida, Boko Haram, and ISIS. Nabeel also explains the influence exerted on Muslims by Islamic religious leaders.

In the end, Nabeel sees two alternatives facing peace-loving Muslims as they come to terms with radical Islam. He suggests that they must either ignore or seek to reinvent the interpretation of their scriptures and centuries of tradition. In his view, this would leave Muslims either apathetic, possibly facing charges of apostasy, or open to radicalization.
