## MS604 APOLOGETICS AND POLEMICS IN MINISTRY AMONG MUSLIMS

## January 12 - May 1, 2026 Mondays . 8-11 am Eastern (New York)

As Jesus and His disciples modeled similar ministry methods in the New Testament, this course equips students to apply apologetics (defending the truth) and polemics (exposing and refuting error) in ministry among Muslims. Students will learn how to respond to common Muslim claims, e.g., that the Bible is corrupt, that Jesus only claimed to be a prophet, and that Christians have gone astray. In addition, the class will explore the work of popular scholars like Jay Smith and others who question the standard Islamic narrative about the origin of Islam. MS604 is team taught by Dr. Fred Farrokh and Dr. Steve Krstulovich.
