This issue of Intercede is dedicated to the women of Islam. Consider with me for a few minutes the scope of what we are considering.

At least half of all the Muslims in the world are women. Fifty percent of 1.2 billion Muslims simply means that there are 600 million Muslim women who need a clear witness of the gospel of Christ.

There are several unique factors that make this a staggering challenge.

First, Islamic culture dictates that Muslim women lead rather sheltered lives. In many cases they have little or no contact with any men outside of their own family circle. And they certainly have no contact with Christian ministers or missionaries unless they are women.

Another challenge in reaching out to women of Islam is the fact that they generally have fewer opportunities for education than do Muslim men. This means that the literacy rate among Muslim women is much lower. Therefore, the printed page is not a viable means of communication with Muslim women in general.

Most Muslim women marry at a fairly young age and spend many years in raising large families. This, of course, is a noble and appropriate activity; but it is also a significant factor to consider if one wishes to communicate the gospel to them.

Islamic culture dictates that Muslim women lead rather sheltered lives.

I have personally lived among Muslims for many years and my wife and I have had the privilege of cultivating some very positive relationships with them. Several Muslims have become family friends. It seemed easier to make friends in the Muslim com-

munity where we lived after we had children. Our children helped open many doors for friendship.

One of our first language teachers was an elderly, dignified Bengali gentleman who was old enough to be our grandfather. He and his wife did, in fact, treat us as if we were a part of their family. When our first daughter was born, they were very happy for us and they purchased gifts for our baby far beyond their financial ability.

How will Muslim women like our teacher's wife ever come to know Jesus as Savior?


My memory of our language teacher's wife is very vivid. She was very religious. She was faithful in her prayers and in keeping the month of fasting. She seemed to be at peace with herself and with the life she lived.

I have to admit that I was surprised to see the expression of inner tranquility in this lady's life. I certainly respected her, but I also knew in my heart that she needed a Savior more than anything else in the world.

Yet how can Muslim women—devout, religious women like our teacher's wife—ever come to know Jesus as Savior?

It will only happen through a deep and loving relationship of a Christian lady friend who can share the life of Christ on a personal level.

What should we be praying for? That God will call women to minister to Muslim women in the love of Jesus Christ. And that women who are called will commit themselves to long-term relationships with Muslim women. A Christian woman must be willing to wait patiently until the Holy Spirit opens her Muslim friend's heart to the truth.



#### Iran

A news update concerning the families of the martyrs Haik Hovsepian-Mehr, Mehdi Dibaj, Hossein Soodmand, and Mohammed Bagher Yusefi has been received. Mrs. Hovsepian expressed her thanks to the thousands of brothers and sisters in the Lord all over the world who have continued to send postcards and letters of encouragement to her. These have given her and the children much joy and a sense of not being forgotten.

Her eldest son Joseph has finished producing his first Farsi movie, "Crossing the Border of the Night." Its world premiere was held at London's Commonwealth Institute. Joseph hopes to continue using his training to produce Farsilanguage movies and videos.

On behalf of the Mehdi Dibaj children, Takoosh expressed her gratitude and joy that all of them have become strong believers.

Sister Aktar Yusefi has just moved to another area of Tehran. The hundreds of letters and postcards she has received have encouraged her. She was greatly disappointed, however, when Iranian customs officials refused to allow her to attend a Christian conference in Armenia. She hopes she will again have freedom to travel.

Recent news about Mahtab Soodmand, the blind widow of the late pastor Hossein Soodmand from Mashhad, is more positive. Even though authorities forced the Assemblies of God church in that city to close its doors, Mrs. Soodmand remained there. For years she suffered from severe depression, but is doing much better now. She recently travelled to Tehran to participate in joyous wedding ceremonies.

#### Pakistan

Pakistan's Christian community spoke out forcefully in early

September against Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif's new 15th Amendment Bill, which is designed to replace the nation's civil legal system with Islamic law. Both Catholic and Protestant church leaders declared the proposed constitutional amendment would curb religious freedoms and subject many non-Muslims to further persecution.

Sharif's proposal would scrap the country's civil laws and install the Koran and Sunnah, the holy books of Islam, as "constitutionally and legally supreme." Sharif insisted the amendment would "protect the rights" of the non-Muslim minorities, some five percent of the national population.

Under the bill, the federal government would be required to enforce Islamic prayers five times a day, collect religious tithes and take responsibility "to prescribe what is right and to forbid what is wrong." Muslim critics claimed the bill would enable the federal government to move towards a personal dictatorship.

Members of the minority Christian and Ahmadi communities have been targeted heavily in recent years by a heavy-handed blasphemy law, which requires the death penalty for anyone insulting the prophet Mohammed.

#### Sudan

The Swiss-based organization Christian Solidarity International is buying slaves from Arab militias in Sudan to set them free. The slaves come from the south and have been taken captive by Islamic groups from the north. In a documentary shown on Dutch television, CSI representative Baroness Caroline Cox was seen to pay 60 Pounds Sterling (approximately 100 US dollars) per slave. In all, 500 slaves were released in this way.

#### Turkeu

A Turkish court handed down stiff sentences in early September to eight members of an outlawed Islamist group convicted of bombing a Christian bookstall in southeastern Turkey last year. A four-year-old boy was killed in the grenade attack. which injured 25 bystanders at Gaziantep's crowded trade fair on September 14, 1997. The bombing had followed several verbal threats against Good News Publishing Company's bookstall, which was legally selling Turkish-language Bibles and a variety of Christian books and tapes at the annual fair.

The convicted bomber, Mehmet Kurt, was given life in prison. Three defendants were given 12-year terms and the others were jailed for three years and nine months.

The Islamist group had weapons and explosives for other planned attacks. Both the Turkish president and prime minister publicly condemned the bombing.

#### Africa

In September 1998, a CMM team held training seminars in Malawi. More than 125 students from the Bible school in Lilongwe and 12 pastors attended the sessions. Everyone attending had a deep burden to reach their Muslim neighbors with the gospel.

Pastors Seminars in Mzuzu and Mangoshi had 150 attendees. The Assemblies of God general superintendent of Malawi related that their Fellowship's goal is to double their number of churches before 2000. They hope that many can be planted in Muslim areas.

Like 75 percent of the women of her country, she is illiterate. However oppressed she might be by her menfolk, she stands little chance of justice. If she has rights, who will tell what they are and how she can obtain them?

Miriam's life is dominated by fear and superstition. She is afraid of evil spirits and of death.

Probably she will visit the family shrine to get help from the *pir* or

'holy man'. He may give her a charm. In return she will give the 'holy man' an offering of a chicken, which she can ill-afford.

She manages to look after the extended family and also helps in the fields in the mornings. She is rarely appreciated—mostly taken for granted, and often abused.

#### ENERADME AHOMS HEB HOWE

Benazir Bhutto is very well-known. She was trained by her father for a life in politics.

Rich and well-educated, she studied at Radcliffe in the United States and the University of Oxford in the United Kingdom.

Despite the many differences in her background, education and experience from those of her illiterate neighbors, she also visits shrines to find spiritual help. Third profile:

#### HIRON NI JJUNA REFUGEE IN NORTH AN AFGHAN

She is 18 years old, and has now lived in North America for 5 years.

Under pressure from her mother and extended family, she has reluctantly agreed to marry a Muslim three times her age. He has been married previously.

Suddenly she is no longer a carefree schoolgirl.

She has become a recluse. When she leaves

her home, she is always heavily veiled. Her younger sisters are shocked by the changes in her life.

Within each Muslim country there are many varieties of Islam: urban in contrast to rural; Sunni in contrast to Shia; liberal, secular or fundamentalist; Muslims in minority as compared with Muslims in majority. There are really no acceptable stereotypes.

There are as many varieties within the household of Islam as there are among those who call themselves Christians. But one thing is for certain: God sent Jesus Christ to earth to die for the sins of all—including Muslim women.

Let believers everywhere reach out to these people in friendship and love—thus giving opportunity to share with Muslims a clear message of Jesus.

In recent months, many Chinese women living in Indonesia have had the unfortunate experience of being raped at the hands of radical Muslims. Alex Buchan interviewed one young victim on the very day that Lt. Gen. Moetojib, the Indonesian army's chief of intelligence, announced that after a two-month riot investigation, all the rape stories had been "fabricated." The woman's tale was shocking.

Traveling on a bus with her brother through Jakarta, she was dragged off the bus by a mob of poorly dressed young men. They tore off her clothes and forced her to run through the streets naked. Herding her into a garage, they raped her for two hours, forcing her brother to watch. As she passed out, the ringleader mutilated her with a piece of barbed wire.

During the rape she couldn't stop thinking, Why is God not striking these men dead?

Waking up while a surgeon was sewing her back together, she had to face the fact that the horrible thing had happened and that her relationships with everyone, including God, would be different from that point forward.

Furious with God for allowing it to happen, she stopped praying.

One night when she was afraid to go to sleep because of the reoccurring nightmares, she picked up her Bible. Immediately the pages fell open at Lamentations 5:11. In her

English Version she read, "On Zion and everywhere in Judah our wives and daughters are

being raped."

She was absolutely astonished. She recalls, "It was a shock to see that my experience, and indeed the experiences of the Chinese Indonesian community, was in the Bible. The sudden descent into anarchy where there had been civilization only moments before; the terrible atrocities perpetrated by evil people against God's chosen—God had seen it all before...it was in the Bible."

What also was strange comfort to her was the fact that she could see no resolution in Lamentations.

"God was silent as His people cried to him in Lamentations, and silent for long periods in other parts of the Bible," she said. The young woman still does not go to church because of one reason: churchgoers cannot handle a lament.

Alex Buchan said he tried to identify with her when he went to church the Sunday following the interview. All of the songs were of victory and triumph—militaristic, confident and loud.

"I saw for the first time how hard it would be for someone to go to church and simply lament," Buchan relates. "Everyone would crowd around trying to perk her up, or they would tire of her gloom and mutter about her *negative spirit*.

But lamenting is part of the Bible; it is part of the faith, and it is part of the persecuted Church. "The Church has to willingly 'weep with those who weep,' knowing that in God's time He will bring healing and triumph if we are willing to identify with the sufferer in his or her pain."

# OUTE CONTRACTOR OF THE STATE OF

God has blessed the Center for Ministry to Muslims by bringing Missionaries Jim and Theda Bennett to us. Jim will serve as associate director of our ministry.

They began their missions ministry in Jordan in 1974. During their 15 years there, Jim served as pastor of the Evangelistic Center and as director of the Jordan Theological College in Amman.

In 1989, Dr. Bennett accepted the appointment as president of Continental Theological Seminary (CTS), in Brussels, Belgium. Under Dr. Bennett's leadership, CTS inaugurated the first Pentecostal graduate program in Europe.

Feeling God leading them back to Jordan, the Bennetts returned there in 1996. Jim again directed the college in Amman. He also served as the Assemblies of God education director for the Middle East and North Africa. In that position he conducted seminars on Islam in many countries and held leadership seminars for national pastors.


Working with CMM, Dr. Bennett will be traveling internationally to teach Islamic seminars and help prepare national constituencies and Bible colleges to reach out to the Muslim world. He will also conduct Islamic seminars in churches and colleges here in the U.S., help prepare missionaries for ministry in Islamic cultures, and encourage regular prayer for Muslims.

"Our family has lived in regions where Muslims account for 95 percent of the population," Jim shares. "While the percentage of Muslims in Western countries is much smaller, we must remember that there are now 1.2 billion Muslims worldwide. This is a rapidly-growing mission field that is in desperate need of the gospel."

Before receiving missionary appointment, the Bennetts pastored churches in Arkansas. Both Jim and Theda completed B.A. degrees in missions at Southwestern Assemblies of God University in Waxahachie, Texas. Jim also completed an M.A. degree in intercultural communications at the Assemblies of God Seminary in Springfield,

Missouri. His doctor of missiology degree was earned at Trinity E v a n g e l i c a l Divinity School in Deerfield, Illinois.

"Without a doubt, God brought Jim and Theda to us," relat-

Please add the Bennetts to your prayer list, asking that God will continue to guide and protect them as they labor in His harvest fields.


# EAGERLAND TEACHES BLOC SESSION AT EVANGEL UNIVERSITY
